For Kimberly native, Dennis Trittin, who now lives in Gig Harbor, Wash., answers to that question led to a book, "What I Wish I Knew at 18: Life Lessons for the Road Ahead."

Sitting at his computer, "I began capturing all the life wisdom I could in terms of personal leadership qualities and pointers for the key life decisions he would be facing, including career, marriage, finances, etc. When midnight struck, I was staring at a computer screen with 100 pointers."

The next day, the exercise had produced something special. "I would have been a much better father had I had this list all along and I knew others could benefit from it as well."

> The first half of the book involves personal leadership qualities to build a strong foundation. Chapters include life perspective, character, relationships and communication, spiritual life, handling adversity and personal productivity.

> The second half focuses on key upcoming life decisions and offers practical, before-the-fact wisdom to guide young people to wise choices. Chapters involve college academics, including Trittin's "killer" study method; care selection and advancement; love and marriage, and managing finances.


"The book is a comprehensive blend of wisdom and about personal leadership and practical success secrets involving key life decisions," Trittin said. "It's designed to be a life coach to guide young people to a thriving adulthood."

Trittin, who graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in accounting, worked with General Electric in Milwaukee before pursuing a master's degree from the University of Washington. He worked for Russell Investments, retiring in 2008 to "serve the community," specifically to develop a financial literacy, leadership and life skills program at an area private school, where he served a chairman of the board of directors.

Since writing the book, Trittin has developed a publishing company called LifeSmart Publishing, that represents the book and the leadership/life skills curriculum that he is marketing to schools, mentor groups and the faith community.

"My focus now is on writing and sharing the mission of this work to help people and make the world a better place," Trittin said. "What has been interesting, however, is that (the book) is a wonderful preparation guide for the adults who influence young people (parents, educators, mentors and faith leaders) because it defines a vision for a successful launch into adulthood."

Copies of the book will be available for purchase at the presentation. The event is a joint venture between the Kimberly High School DECA chapter and Capital Credit Union, which will be providing some great prizes and information.
